Please note, Stella our chiropodist will not be in during February but her next visit is scheduled for Monday 7th March, so not long to wait.


Grace, our hairdresser, continues to visit every Friday morning.

- Chinese New Year isn't on the same day every year.
- It's usually in late January or February.
- The date is worked out by the "New Moon".
- This is when there is a new lunar cycle and is the first phase of the moon when it is a crescent moon.
- It celebrates the start of new life and is sometimes known as the Spring Festival.

- The Chinese calendar goes in a cycle of 12 years.
- Each year is symbolised by a different animal.
- It is believed that if you are born in a particular year then you will have some of the characteristics of that animal.
- The Chinese New Year isn't only celebrated on one day. Traditionally it is celebrated across 15 days and ends when there is a full moon.
- The end of the New Year period is celebrated with the Lantern Festival.
- ▶ During Chinese New Year, children receive red envelopes with money inside. The amount of money can be any amount but never includes the number 4 and the amount shouldn't be able to divide by four. This is because the number four in Chinese sounds a bit like death!
- Lion and dragon dances are very popular in China, especially during the Chinese New Year. It is believed that they will bring good fortune to the local area. During these dances you will hear lots of loud drums. The loud noise is said to drive all of the bad luck and spirits away.
